Local Control and Accountability Plan and Annual Update Template

The Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) and annual update template shall be used to provide details regarding local educational agencies' (LEAs) actions and expenditures to support pupil outcomes and overall performance pursuant to Education Code sections 52060, 52066, 47605, 47605.5, and 47606.5.

Course access: pupil enrollment in a broad course of study that includes all of the subject areas described in Education Code section 51210 and subdivisions (a) to (i), inclusive, of Section 51220, as applicable. (Priority 7)

Expelled pupils (for county offices of education only): coordination of instruction of expelled pupils pursuant to Education Code section 48926. (Priority 9)

Foster youth (for county offices of education only): coordination of services, including working with the county child welfare agency to share information, responding to the needs of the juvenile court system, and ensuring transfer of health and education records. (Priority 10)

B. Pupil Outcomes:

Pupil achievement: performance on standardized tests, score on Academic Performance Index, share of pupils that are college and career ready, share of English learners that become English proficient, English learner reclassification rate, share of pupils that pass Advanced Placement exams with 3 or higher, share of pupils determined prepared for college by the Early Assessment Program. (Priority 4)

Other pupil outcomes: pupil outcomes in the subject areas described in Education Code section 51210 and subdivisions (a) to (i), inclusive, of Education Code section 51220, as applicable. (Priority 8)

C. Engagement:

Parent involvement: efforts to seek parent input in decision making, promotion of parent participation in programs for unduplicated pupils and special need subgroups. (Priority 3)

Pupil engagement: school attendance rates, chronic absenteeism rates, middle school dropout rates, high school dropout rates, high school graduations rates. (Priority 5)

School climate: *pupil suspension rates, pupil expulsion rates, other local measures including surveys of pupils, parents and teachers on the sense of safety and school connectedness. (Priority 6)*

KIPP Empower Academy has a strong history of engaging our parents. The Local Control Accountability Plan offers another method for our parents to be engaged. Standing and new parent engagement strategies are outlined below:

These hours can include helping in the classroom, with arrival and dismissal, in the office, at special events, and also donating items to the school. We also have monthly Parent Leadership Council meetings to discuss fundraisers, school concerns, and special events.</p>	<p>Through their continuous volunteer work in the classroom our parents are familiar with the students needs and pulled on this experience to make recommendations.</p>
<p>LCAP Meeting: A planning meeting is being held with teachers and administration on April 3, 2014. In addition a meeting with parents is being held on March 26, 2014 to review the draft of the plan. We invited all families to come to a meeting to learn about LCFF and give their feedback on our goals for the eight state priorities. The meeting first started with an explanation of the new Local Control Funding Formula and how it differs from how schools were funded in the past. Attendees learned how the formula is executed and how the schools are going to be help accountable for the funds through the LCAP and the eight state priorities. Next, the meeting shifted to presenting KEAs LCAP. Each goal was presented by identifying what state priority it was addressing, which students the goal was aimed towards and how we were measuring progress.</p>	<p>Parents and other attendees responded well to the LCAP meeting and they provided verbal feedback on our 8 goals. As each goal was presented parents provided real time feedback to the school leader.</p> <p>No major changes were made to the goals based on the verbal feedback of the audience.</p>

Funding for unduplicated counts has increased to an estimated \$304,795 for the 2014-15 LCAP year. Given that approximately 85% of our students qualify for the unduplicated count, we are applying the supplemental and concentration LCFF funding on a charterwide basis. Based on the fact that we desire a) to provide excellent small group and individualized instruction that will result in all students reaching their individual MAP goals, b) to provide targeted behavioral support to reduce suspensions, and c) enable every student to have access to 1:1 technology to enhance core curriculum, we will invest spend approximately \$305,000 on Intervention Teachers, Instructional Aides, a Counselor, and classroom technology and software.

We determined that we needed to increase or improve individual and targeted instruction, access to technology and software to enhance the core curriculum, and targeted behavioral support to the unduplicated student population by 8.63% given the increase in funds generated by such students. In order to accomplish this, we will increase and improve the services for these students by hiring Intervention Teachers and Instructional Aides and a Counselor, as well as investing in classroom technology and software.
